Are you not involved or excited about riding? Have you lost the spark you had when you first joined? How do we get that excitement to return?

Read. Subscribe to enthusiast publications or find them at the local library. Motorcycle magazines have many exciting stories of people like us doing what we love to do. The internet has opportunities to learn about riding techniques that can make our sport safer and more entertaining. Knowledge is power and a tool kit you can use when someone asks about your riding skills.

Take classes. After riding for 27 years, I finally took the Basic Riding Course. For me it was mostly a review, but for several others in the class, I was an example to follow. They asked me about my riding because they saw something they wanted.

Practice. Put all the knowledge from the reading material and the riding classes into actual performance. Smoothly navigating through a crowded parking lot or a busy gas station will draw attention to you, in a good way. This attention will increase exponentially when in a group of like-minded riders.

Being the good rider that you are, and working to be the great rider you want to be, will attract people to you. All you need to do is answer their questions with the sincerity and energy that you have for motorcycling. The inquirer will want what you have. Lead by example. Because of your continued practice and education in our sport, you will attract new members without any extra special effort.
